Patient Highlight: **RAY**

ay is a patient at St. KMary's Medical Center currently receiving care under the Adolescent Day Treatment Center (ADTC) program with the McAuley Institute. As an only child who resided at home with his alcoholic stepfather and mentally ill mother, Ray had an unstable life prior to his admission at ADTC. His mother had a history of poor compliance with her medications and substance abuse, which resulted in repeated psychiatric hospitalizations. His parents frequently engaged in loud abusive arguments that would escalate to physical abuse, and often times Ray would

be attacked in the crossfire. Ray was totally isolated in his home with very little stimuli except television and his schoolwork. As time progressed, Ray began to display many self destructive and suicidal behaviors and eventually required numerous psychiatric hospitalizations. After Ray was admitted to the ADTC program, it took several months for Ray to begin a trusting relationship with his various therapists and admit to the chaos of his home situation, including physical abuse and neglect. Child Protective Services saw the threats in the environment Ray lived in and eventually

removed Ray from his home. He was placed in a group home where he thrived and was prescribed psychotropic medications to address his depressive and psychotic symptoms, which provided positive results.

However, one side effect of the medications was an increase in appetite and within a year, Ray gained nearly 50 pounds. ADTC formed a skill building group to focus on the health needs of Ray and other clients who need assistance in making important lifestyle choices. When living with his parents, what food the family had in the home generally came from take-out restaurants. It soon became apparent that

Ray and many others in the group had never gone grocery shopping or cooked a meal for themselves. The skill building group addressed many healthy lifestyle choices, including selecting appropriate foods, portion control, exercise and appropriate sleeping habits. Within 4 months of attendance, Ray has lost weight, admitted to feeling better and is functioning more independently. He recently graduated from ADTC's high school and is planning for a complete discharge from the program within a few months. For information and admissions: Day Treatment Center - (415) 750-4909. Joan was the current president of the St. Mary's Auxiliary and member of the Foundation Board of Directors. She was well respected for her advocacy and gentle manner. She passed away gracefully on September 8, 2013.
